
through their sacred land



Why were the Native Americans worried about an oil pipeline going through their Sacred Land?

- The Native Americans say that the pipeline threatens their water supply from the Missouri river, crosses sacred land, and was approved without proper consultation with tribal leaders and without a thorough study of impacts.
- During the days leading up to the rally, Native American leaders and activists met with members of Congress to press them to protect tribal rights. Leaders also set up an encampment of tipis near the Washington monument and held cultural workshops.




Anishinaabe Women



"The beginning"

The Standing Rock movement began in April of 2016 as a resistance against the Dakota Access
Pipeline. Initiated by LaDonna Brave Bull Allard, a preservation officer with the Standing Rock Indian
Reservation, it took place first on Allard's land on the banks of the Cannonball River in North Dakota,
but soon spread to other camps as hundreds and eventually thousands of "water protectors" joined
the movement known as (The Standing Rock).



The Youth Organization

• The standing rock was a youth organization and started off with about 5 teenagers and it got bigger and bigger over time until there were hundreds of native Americans and the entire organization was meant for prayer and celebration, but turned into a big war over their sacred land.



The fight against sacred land

• The native Americans fought for a long time for their sacred land. The Bakken Holdings company wanted to put a oil pipeline going through their sacred land. They were scared it was going to contaminate their fresh water.





Why did the Bakken Holdings company want to put the oil pipeline in that place to begin with?

• So basically the safest way to transport oil is with underground oil pipelines. If they don't use oil pipelines they have to use oil rail cars and trucks, and doing it that way, you spill more oil then doing it underground.
